Letter from the Chief of Police

Mayor Inman, City Administrator Torreson, City Council Members, and Citizens of Macomb,

On behalf of the men and women of the Macomb Police Department I am pleased to provide you with our annual report for 2015. The report provides a summary of the activity and accomplishments of the Macomb Police Department during the past year.

In 2014 the Macomb Police Department received 14,767 calls for service. This was a 2.2% decrease from the 15,091 calls for service received in 2013. Investigators and Patrol Officers worked very diligently in solving burglary cases from 2013 and 2014. There was also a very strong emphasis on drug cases and arresting individuals with outstanding warrants. These efforts led to an overall 29% reduction in Part I crimes. Burglaries decreased 56% from 117 reported in 2013 to 51 reported in 2014. Thefts decreased 22% from 277 reported in 2013 to 214 reported in 2014. Even though crime was down overall in 2014 Macomb Police investigated two homicides. Both cases were investigated thoroughly and brought to a conclusion.

In this report we highlighted major cases for 2014. Solving burglaries and arresting the perpetrators was a major focus for the Investigation Division. The investigations and Patrol Divisions did an excellent job working together to serve warrants, solve fraud and counterfeit cases along with numerous other cases. Our drug unit once again was very successful in conducting narcotics investigations. We continue to work with our partners in law enforcement at the county, state and federal levels to solve crimes and to ensure everyone in our community is safe.

The men and women of the Macomb Police Department are very proud of these and many other accomplishments in 2014. We will along with our colleagues in other city departments continue to strive to make Macomb one of the safest and most desirable communities to live, raise a family and conduct business. We appreciate the significant resources dedicated to our department by the Mayor and Council Members and trust that you will find your investment is being used wisely.

Western EMS and volunteered at the Emmet-Chalmers Fire Department.



Officer of the Year 2014

The Police Officer of the Year award shall be bestowed upon one police officer annually in recognition of those qualities which distinguished him or her as a professional in the field of policing. It shall serve as proper recognition among fellow officers and the public alike for this individual's dedication to duty, outstanding job performance, unsullied moral character, exceptional community/civic leadership or service, professional police image and bearing. The Chief of Police shall make the final selection among the nominations forwarded considering the following criteria or guidelines;

1. To receive the Police Officer of the Year award, an officer should be an outstanding police officer who has had an excellent work record over the past year.
2. He/she should be the type of officer who is admired by other officers and his/her dedication to the Department and its goals should be obvious to all.
3. He/she should present the best possible image to the public.
4. The officer is devoted to duty beyond the requirements of the job which included enforcement, community activities and enhancing the image of the Department.
5. The officer has positive supervisory performance evaluations for the year under consideration.
6. The officer produces quality work and demonstrates above average initiative in the performance of his/her duties.

In early 2015, Supervisors submitted nominations for officers that met the rigid standards. A panel reviewed the nominations and forwarded recommendations to the Chief of Police. Once the Chief was confident the nominations met the criteria, the award was granted.

Awards and Commendations

Letter of Commendation

In February of 2014 Officer Lindsey May was presented with a Letter of Commendation for actions in December of 2013. Officer May was assisting investigations in several burglaries in the northwest part of town. Using his observation skills Officer May stopped a subject walking down the street that appeared to match a suspect. The subsequent investigation led to several arrests of individuals who were found to be responsible for at least 8 burglaries in the area. This incident demonstrated Officer May's dedication, devotion, initiative and tenacity in serving the citizens of Macomb.

Life Saving Award

In February of 2014 Officers Todd Tedrow and Wiley were presented with the Macomb Police Department Lifesaving Award for actions in December of 2013. Both Officers responded to a call of a reported suicide attempt. Working together the Officers were able to remove the mechanism of the suicide attempt and saved the subjects life. This incident demonstrated Officer Tedrow and Officer Wiley's care for all human life.

In February of 2014 the Macomb Police Department honored Western Illinois Students John M. Ganta, Daniel R. Comyn and Alexander Flisk for coming to the aid of a pedestrian in dire need. On February 7th, 2014, while the area was experiencing record cold temperatures, the three men were walking home when they encountered a female subject passed out in the 100 block of E. Adams. The female subject was incoherent and suffering from severe exposure to the weather. The three men recognized the need to act for the life and safety of the young woman and they took her to a local business to warm her up and call 911. The action of these three men undoubtedly saved this woman's life. These three men were honored for their willingness to help out another in a time of need.

2014 in Summary

Promotions

In 2014 the Macomb Police Department promoted two officers in rank. Jason York was promoted from the rank of Sergeant to Lieutenant. Lt. York worked in investigations for almost five years with a primary focus on drug related cases. Lt. York was officially promoted on May 10th, 2014.

Lindsey May was officially promoted to the rank of Sergeant on May 10th, 2014. Sergeant May came from the patrol division where he served as a K-9 officer for several years. Sgt. May took over the drug investigations position.

With these new promotions, Sgt. May gave up his position of K-9 Officer. Sgt. May handed over Kappes' leash to Officer Derek Wiley. Officer Wiley attended K-9 handler school at the ISP Academy in the fall of 2014.

Highlights of Major Cases in 2014

Homicide

On February 16th, 2014 Macomb Officers were dispatched to 515 E. Pierce Street in reference to a subject who had been involved in a fight with his roommate. The caller indicated the roommate had since quit breathing and was requesting assistance. Responding officers found 43 year old Ramone Doyle unresponsive in the residence. Doyle was later pronounced dead at MDH. An investigation determined that Doyle and his roommate had got into a fight and the roommate choked Doyle out. Thinking that Doyle was just asleep the roommate left him there and checked on him later when he found that Doyle was not breathing. A full investigation was conducted and presented to the McDonough County States Attorney who denied seeking charges against the roommate classifying the incident as self-defense.

Missing Person/Homicide

On February 27th, 2014 Macomb Officers were dispatched to 1513 E. Murray for a missing persons report. Residents of the house arrived home after work to find a large part of the living room carpet missing, blood on the walls and two roommates missing. All subjects involved worked for the Enbridge Pipeline Company. The investigation quickly identified a suspect. Working with the Illinois State Police, Office of Public Safety at Western Illinois University, McDonough County Sheriff's Office, FBI and U.S. Marshal's investigators were able to quickly track the suspect to Pekin, IL and then Colorado. Working with the U.S. Marshals the suspect was apprehended in Denver, CO. Marshalls there were able to interview the suspect who admitted that the victim was deceased but did not reveal a location of the body. Sadly the suspect took his own life shortly after being interviewed while in the Marshal's custody. Statements made lead investigators to believe that the victim was in the local landfill and an excavation effort was undertaken. No remains have ever been recovered.

Drug Cases

2014 saw a changing of the guard in drug investigations. Jason York was promoted to Lieutenant and went back to the patrol division. Lindsey May was promoted to Sergeant and took over the position of drug investigator.

In May and June of 2014 Sgt. May made several controlled purchases of cannabis from several members of the same family living in Macomb. On July 1st, 2014 Officers from the Illinois State Police Tactical Response Team and the Macomb Police/McDonough County Sheriff's Department Strategic Response Team executed three search warrants in Macomb. Several thousand dollars of US currency, two vehicles and a smoker were seized as a result of this investigation. Four arrests were made.

In July of 2014 the Investigations Division was provided information of a subject who was manufacturing methamphetamine in Macomb. An investigation led to the arrest of three subjects who were involved in a conspiracy to manufacture methamphetamine. This investigation resulted in the seizure of a pick-up truck and over \$700 of US Currency.

In late August 2014 Sgt. May again made several controlled purchases of cannabis from a subject in Macomb. In early September a search warrant was conducted which led to the arrest of five subjects on various charges. Officers seized raw cannabis, psilocybin mushrooms and several edible items that contained THC. Officers also seized several thousand dollars in US Currency which awaits disposition by the courts. This case also led to one suspect being charged with intimidation following their initial arrest.

After a two month investigation Officers from the Macomb Police Department, McDonough County Sheriff's Office, WIU Office of Public Safety and the Illinois State Police served several search and arrest warrants on December 10th, 2014. A total of 12 suspects were arrested. Charges ranged from Possession and Delivery of Cannabis to Possession and Delivery of a controlled substance. Subjects arrested were involved in the distribution and/or possession of cannabis, prescription medication, psilocybin mushrooms, cocaine, and LSD.

In addition to those above, Sgt. May conducted several investigations with the US Postal service involving subjects here in Macomb receiving illegal drugs through the mail. Five suspects were arrested over a couple of months' time period. Several pounds of cannabis and several hundred dollars was seized. Subjects were getting cannabis shipped through the mail from California, Oregon and Colorado.

Drug arrests are not confined to the investigations division. Officers commonly make drug arrests from routine traffic stops. Notably on September 7th, 2014 an officer's attention was

gained by a vehicle travelling the wrong way on a one-way street. The officer stopped the vehicle and found the driver to be violating her restricted driving permit. A search of the vehicle resulted in the recovery of 227.9 grams of powdered cocaine and over \$2,600 in US Currency. This case was found to be tied to a multi-state cocaine trafficking operation between Missouri and the Quad Cities. A suspect in Rock Island fled after being contacted by authorities there.

Other Notable Cases

In May of 2014 several businesses in Macomb reported receiving counterfeit money. Two businesses reported to the department that they had received denominations of \$5 and \$50 bills that were found to be counterfeit. A quick and intensive investigation into the allegations quickly produced a suspect. A search warrant was conducted which led to the arrest of the suspect and the recovery of items believed related to the case. The suspect later reached a plea deal with the States Attorney's office.

In August of 2014 the Investigations Division followed up on a Crimestoppers tip about the location of items stolen from the Macomb Park District, Spring Lake location in 2013. Officers were able to recover a Blue Holland tractor valued at over \$13,400 and several other items stolen during the burglary. In addition officers were able to help solve burglaries in Warren and Mercer Counties. Three arrests were made as a result of this investigation.

On October 30th, 2014 Officers from the Macomb Police Department worked with Officers from the US Marshall's Office to apprehend a fugitive sex offender. The suspect, wanted on a \$125,000 Will County warrant and a \$4,000 LaSalle County Warrant, was located at a residence in Macomb. The subject was also charged for Failure to Register as a Sex Offender and currently resides in the McDonough County Jail. In addition the subject was determined to be a suspect in several local fraud cases.

In June of 2014, the Macomb Police Department investigated one of their own on fraud and forgery charges. The officer was accused of forging a check on the account of an elderly subject he had befriended and was supposed to be assisting. In addition the officer was found to have obtained state benefits in the victim's name and used those benefits to the officer's advantage. Criminal charges were filed against the officer by the Illinois State Police and the officer has since resigned from the Macomb Police Department. The case is still pending.

Strategic Response Team (S.R.T.)



2014 was another successful year for the Macomb Police / McDonough County Sheriff's Department Strategic Response Team (SRT). The SRT members engaged in over 798 hours of training in skills ranging from suspect management, approach and deployment, first aid, room entry, and warrant service. This year SRT gained a member that rejoined the Sheriff's Department. Macomb Police added 3 officers to the team to bring our total

manpower to 15 operators. This gives the SRT the flexibility to respond to incidents within the county without compromising patrol and other supplementary divisions.

2014 brought us 5 different narcotic warrant operations. SRT continues to maintain its 100% safety record. No officer or suspect has been injured in operations. To maintain this record of safety, the team was able to purchase and receive training in the use of Noise / Flash Distraction Devices. Commonly known as "flash bangs," these devices are meant to stun and surprise potentially dangerous suspects or animals. This allows the team to overcome resistance and make arrests more safely.

It is also worth noting officers assigned to SRT are able to carry their first aid and protective equipment while on regular patrol. In the unfortunate world of school and workplace violence, these officers, with their extra training and equipment, can make a great difference should a horrible event like that happen within the county.

MPD's K-9 Program

There was a change for the Macomb Police Department K-9 program in 2014. A new K-9 handler was appointed for K-9 Kappes with the promotion of Lindsey May to Sergeant. The new handler appointed is Officer Derek Wiley. Officer Wiley has been with the Macomb Police Department since 2011. Officer Wiley took possession of Kappes over the summer and in August of 2014 he attended K-9 certification training at the Illinois State Police Academy. Officer Wiley trains with K-9 Kappes and K-9 Officer Tedrow who remains K-9 Landres' handler. Both K-9 teams are easy to spot with specialized Chevy Tahoe patrol vehicles. The dogs are trained to detect the odor of narcotics and are used to combat drugs in the community. The K-

9 teams are generally on patrol, but they can be seen at the train station and public presentations.

Officer Tedrow and K9 Landres have been working together for three years. Over the past year Officer Tedrow and K9 Landres have been deployed 54 times. These deployments resulted in 22 misdemeanor charges and 5 felony charges. Officer Tedrow and K-9 Landres have helped with 5 school searches. Officer Wiley has deployed K9 Kappes 33 times in 2014.

During the last year the Macomb Police Department range was used by the Macomb Police Department, WIU Office of Public Safety, McDonough County Sheriff's Office and the Illinois State Police District 14. The training over the last year has included handgun qualifications, rifle qualifications and basic training for both handgun and rifle. The range has also been used for the Special Response Team for search warrant service and practice. In November the range was open for a Saturday so that local hunters could site in their shotguns for hunting season. This program is done every year as a public service.

D.A.R.E./SRO



D.A.R.E. (Drug Abuse Resistance Education) is a collaborative effort by D.A.R.E. certified law enforcement officers, educators, students, parents, and the community to offer an educational program in the classroom to prevent or reduce drug abuse and violence among children and youth. The emphasis of D.A.R.E. is to help students recognize and resist the many direct and subtle pressures that influence students to experiment with alcohol, tobacco, marijuana, inhalants, or other drugs, or to engage in violence.

The ten week program offers preventive strategies to enhance those protective factors - especially bonding to the family, school, and community - which research has shown to foster development of resiliency in students who may be at risk for substance abuse or other problem behaviors. The Macomb Police Department's D.A.R.E. program started in the mid-1980's and has had several instructors since its introduction.

The **School Resource Officer (S.R.O.)** should be viewed as a resource to which the school community can rely on as a law enforcement officer, a law-related counselor, and a law-related teacher. The S.R.O. not only keeps the peace in the schools but provides resource guidance to students, parents, faculty and staff, and educates through presentations a better understanding of our local, state, and federal laws.

The S.R.O. also serves as a positive role model for the students at school during school hours and off the school grounds at extracurricular activities.

Macomb Police Explorers Post #4044

The Macomb Police Explorers Post #4044 is a joint program between the Boy Scouts of America and the Macomb Police Department. Its purpose is to educate students who have an interest in the profession of Law Enforcement. The program is for high school and college students between the ages of 14 and 20. The Explorer program adheres to a schedule of education and training that not only teaches the students different skills needed for the law enforcement profession but prepares the students to participate in ride-along situations with our officers. The students learn: how to effectively use police radios, how traffic stops are done, how to write out tickets and accident reports, traffic and criminal laws, HazMat and First Aid skills, and firearm usage and safety. The current Explorer program has approximately 12-15 students in participation and is mainly comprised of first or second year college students.

Vehicle Impoundment Program

The Vehicle Impoundment program continues to be successful in utilizing new state legislature that allows police departments to impound vehicles for certain violations. The violations included are primarily safety and licensing violations such as Driving Under the Influence of Alcohol, Driving While License Suspended/Revoked, Fleeing a Police Officer, Drug Offenses, or Leaving the scene of an Accident. Over the past three years, the Macomb Police Department has had a high level of success in utilizing the program. In 2014 there were 248 vehicles impounded under the program.

The Macomb Police Department's enforcement of the above violations along with the subsequent towing and impoundment of the offender's vehicle is a continuous effort to make the roads safer for the law abiding motoring public. In 2009 at the beginning of the program the Macomb Police Department handled 118 hit and run accidents. In 2014 only 76 hit and run accidents were reported.

In 2014 the Macomb Police Department installed cameras at the impound lot in order to be able to record activity that occurs at the lot. This system will automatically track activity inside the impound and record any activity that occurs. This system is designed to enhance the security of the impound and safeguard property.

Sex Offender Registration and Notification Act Highlights

The department participated in helping insure compliance by conducting physical address checks. Macomb Police also worked in cooperation with Federal Bureau of Prisons Parole Agents to check compliance of area federal offenders as well. All were compliant.

In November of 2014 an alert citizen tipped police, through our social media outlets, to an unregistered sex offender living in the area. Macomb Police with help of US Marshal's Service tracked down and located the fugitive sex offender at a girlfriend's residence in Macomb. The subject was later charged with several Registration violations and he was tied to other fraud / theft cases.

ILEAP Accreditation

The department remains professionally accredited by the Illinois Association of Chiefs of Police through their Illinois Law Enforcement Accreditation Program (ILEAP). The ILEAP Accreditation award symbolizes the department's achievement in excellence. The agency has reached a level of professional esteem through audits, inspections, and peer critique in an effort to maintain the best practices in the field of policing. The department has been accredited since October of 2012 and will seek further accreditation in 2016.

Social Media Initiatives

Macomb Police have a wonderful relationship with the community. We are striving for ways to interact with our population. Because of the growth of technology, mobile devices, and social media, the Macomb Police Department is active on our website (www.macombpolice.com) as well as on Facebook and Twitter, @MacombPolice. Citizens can stay up to date with information we post. Many people have interacted with officers and asked questions through social media that they did not feel warranted a phone call. We even had crime tips come through social media, but we insist that information come through dispatch or Crimestoppers. Macomb Police has nearly 5000 followers on Facebook and Twitter combined. Many of our posts, media releases, weather or crash announcements, and photos are viewed thousands of times. This technology has helped us connect with the young mobile population at our high school and Western Illinois University.







2014 Polar Plunge

A polar plunge is an event held during the winter where participants enter a body of water despite the low temperature. In the United States polar plunges are usually held to raise money for a charitable organization. Officers from the Macomb Police Dept. take place in the annual event held at Lake Story in Galesburg, IL. Macomb officers raise money with the proceeds going toward the Special Olympics.

Special Olympics is an international organization that changes lives by promoting understanding, acceptance and inclusion between people with and without intellectual disabilities. Through year-round sports training and athletic competition and other related programming for more than 3 million children and adults with intellectual



disabilities in more than 180 countries, Special Olympics has created a model community that celebrates people's diverse gifts. Founded in 1968 by Eunice Kennedy Shriver, Special Olympics provide people with intellectual disabilities continuing opportunities to realize their potential, develop physical fitness, and demonstrate courage and experience joy and friendship. Special Olympics Illinois does not charge athletes or their families to participate in the program.

The **Shop-With-A-Cop** program is an annual program sponsored by the Macomb Fraternal Order of Police Lodge #189. Each year several children from the Macomb area are selected to be taken to a local department store. Officers spend a few hours with the children and their parents/guardians while shopping for school clothing and supplies.

The event was named after Scott Jennings who was killed 33 years ago in an accident which occurred the day before the first Fishing Contest for Children.
