

Awards and Commendations

Life Saving Award

In March of 2015 Officers Brandon Coulombe and Andrew Gillespie-Connor were presented with the Macomb Police Department Lifesaving Award for actions in January of 2015. Both Officers responded to a call of a woman down in the Wal-Mart parking lot. Officer Coulombe immediately started life saving measures. Upon his arrival Officer Gillespie-Connor began working with Officer Coulombe to continue CPR until paramedics could arrive. For their quick thinking and teamwork they were presented with the Macomb Police Department Lifesaving Award.

Letter of Commendation

In May of 2015 Letters of Commendation were given to Officers Brandon Coulombe and Andrew Gillespie-Connor for their efforts that led to a search warrant and the recovery of a significant amount of Methamphetamine and Methamphetamine making materials. Both responded to a call and looked beyond what the original call was about and determined the two subjects to be involved with Meth. They conducted interviews and passed their information on to the investigations team who were able to obtain a search warrant and make multiple arrests.

Alliance Against Intoxicated Motorists

In 2015, four officers — Derek Wiley, Nick Goc, Jacob Rhodes and Matthew Marass — received certificates of appreciation on behalf of the Alliance Against Intoxicated Motorists for "exceptional DUI enforcement."

According to a letter sent from AAIM to Chief Barker, the organization conducts an annual DUI survey of more than 700 police agencies across the state. Officer Goc has received the AAIM certificate of appreciation for the past seven years.



Life Saving Award

In June of 2015 Officers Todd Tedrow and Derek Wiley were presented with the Macomb Police Department Lifesaving Award for actions in May of 2015. Both officers were dispatched to a suicidal subject call. Upon arrival one of the officers observed the subject inside attempting to hang themselves. Both Officers took swift action to enter the residence and remove the subject from the noose. For their actions both Officers were awarded the Macomb Police Department Lifesaving Award. This is the second Lifesaving award both officers have received.

Burnham was able to quickly identify and arrest the perpetrator easing the communities concern about this issue. For his quick work Lt. Burnham was presented with a Letter of Commendation.

Officer Jacob Rhodes was presented with two letters of commendation for two separate incidents in 2015. In February 2015 Officer Rhodes assisted the investigations division with a number of burglaries. His efforts led to the identification and arrest of a suspect. Officer Rhodes was also recognized, as well as Officer Bill Lipcamon, for their efforts to solve two December 2015 home invasions. Both officers worked with the investigations division to identify and interview suspects. Using their investigative skills they were able to make several arrests and recover two firearms from the case. (Officer Lipcamon was not able to attend the awards ceremony due to his military service.)

Citizen Award of Appreciation

In June of 2015 Jim Howard was presented with a Citizens Award of Appreciation for his actions in early May 2015. Howard was working in his position with the Demand Services division of McDonough County Public Transportation system when he observed an elderly woman struggling with a young man in the parking lot of Wal-Mart. Howard yelled at the man to leave the woman alone and the man fled. Howard followed the man until the man eventually stopped running and kept him there until the police arrived. The man was a career criminal who had stolen the woman's checkbook. For his concern for the community and well-being of others and his willingness to assist the citizens of this community Howard was presented with a citizens Award of Appreciation.

2015 in Summary

Highlights of Major Cases

Burglaries

In January 2015 there was a rash of burglaries that took place in the north east section of Macomb. These burglaries centered around the 300, 400, 500 and 700 blocks of E Jackson St area to include E Calhoun St. Detectives spent a few days on foot patrol in an attempt catch someone that might be involved. In February a door to door canvass was successful when Sgt. May and Officer Rhodes made contact with a subject at 731 ½ E Calhoun St. A male subject, who was on parole, later identified as Michael Burns answered the door and eventually made a false 911 armed robbery call of Ayerco East. After serving a warrant on the residence, numerous stolen items were recovered from the apartment to include a stolen gun. Burns was charged federally to be prosecuted.

Robbery

In March a male subject was robbed while walking home from Ayerco West Convenience Store. The suspect took approximately \$400 in cash from the highly intoxicated subject. A check of the video from the location revealed that there were three subjects inside Ayerco prior to the robbery that matched the description of the suspect. All three suspects, Keianna Miller, Jamal McDaniel and Damien Lewis admitted to their participation in the robbery. All three were prosecuted.

Child Pornography

In April the Macomb Police Department received a call from the State Attorney General's office in reference to child pornography being downloaded to a person's Cloud account with Microsoft. The suspect resided in Thompson hall and a search warrant was obtained to search his room for a phone and computer. The suspect was interviewed during the warrant and confessed to having child pornography on his phone and computer. There were 19 images on his phone that could have been charged as all class X felonies.

Home Invasions

In December a home invasion/armed robbery was reported at 637 N Johnson St. During that home invasion a black male subject entered the residence and held three subjects at gun point. The robbery failed when the suspect left without taking any money. Investigators were able to come up with suspects in this case, but later determined that they were not involved in this

case but were involved in several auto burglaries. Later in December a second home invasion/armed robbery was reported at 908 N Charles St apartment 58. During that investigation discrepancies were found in the victims' story. It was later determined that the two incidents were drug related and that one of the victims from N. Charles was involved in the 637 N Johnson St home invasion. Four arrests were made in connection with this and the earlier home invasion. Two guns were also recovered that had been used in the robbery.

Burglary

A burglary occurred to Discount Tobacco; located in the Maclan Plaza, in early September. Using footage from several video surveillance systems in the area Investigators were able to identify a suspect. The suspect was also sought in a theft case at Wal-Mart from earlier in the year. Officers were able to arrest the suspect and also clear up a burglary that had occurred in Bushnell.

Stolen Vehicles

In April the department took a report of a stolen vehicle from the 100 block of W. Jefferson. Upon entering the stolen vehicle into the nationwide law enforcement database it was learned that the vehicle had already been located near Canton, MO. Detective Cremer processed the vehicle and collected evidence from it. Fingerprints were recovered however no suspect has been identified at this time.

In July the department took a report of a stolen vehicle from the 900 block of N. Charles. The suspects were known to the victim and had also taken his cell phone. Detectives were able to track the cell phone and located it in Hutchinson, KS. Authorities there were contacted and Det. Cremer was able to coordinate and direct officials there to the vehicle. The suspects were known to law enforcement there and a search warrant was obtained for their residence. Both subjects were arrested and extradited back to the McDonough County Jail.

Drug Cases

2015 was a busy year for Drug Investigations. Sgt. Lindsey May reports that 104 people were arrested on felony drug charges. Sgt. May also reports a total of 11 guns taken off of the street and a total of 39 search warrants served.

Sgt. May lists the following cases as notable for drug investigations:

Acting on information gathered from patrol officers a search warrant was conducted on a residence in the 500 block of N. Johnson. Officers located an active meth lab in the residence. A total of 6 people were arrested for their involvement in the manufacturing of methamphetamine.

Acting on a tip and confirmation of provided information a search warrant was conducted on a residence in the 900 block of E. Jackson. Officers located a large and sophisticated indoor and outdoor marijuana grow operation. Two subjects were arrested on felony charges.

On 03/27/2015 4 search warrants were executed. 10 subjects were arrested on felony drug charges. A total of 4 pounds of cannabis, prescription pills and cocaine were recovered during the search. Later in the year a search warrant was executed on one of the same residences in the 600 block of W. Adams Street where 21.6 grams of cocaine was recovered and one subject was arrested.

Additionally Sgt. May has worked closely with the McDonough County Sherriff's Office and the Office of Public Safety at WIU on several cases. St. May has worked with the Peoria area task force on a drug and gun case. Sgt. May also worked very closely with the United States Postal Inspector to make a case on a subject in California who was mailing illegal narcotics to a subject in Macomb. Sgt. May has several cases that have been taken by the U.S. Attorney's Office for charges in federal court.

Other Notable Cases

In April the drug unit of the Macomb Police Department purchased a handgun from Travaughn Miller. A federal arrest warrant was served on Miller where officers located a large amount of cannabis at his residence. Two other subjects were charged with felony drug charges related to this case.

In May a subject had gone to a residence in the 300 block of W Murray St and spray painted racial slurs on the side of the house. Officers responded and interviewed the suspect without the suspect confessing to the incident. Detectives took over the case and were able to link the suspect that had been interviewed by officers prior. Video surveillance footage was located at

Wal-Mart of the suspect purchasing spray paint. An arrest warrant was obtained for the suspect and Lt. Burnham and Sgt. May located him in Joliet at Harrah's Casino. The suspect was interviewed and confessed to the incident.

In June the local Enterprise Car Rental office located at the train station was burglarized. Taken in the burglary was the key to a vehicle that was stolen. Chicago Police located the vehicle with a subject inside and he was arrested for possession of a stolen vehicle. Lt. Burnham and Sgt. May went to Chicago to interview the suspect in the case. He confessed to the burglary and to stealing the vehicle. He was never charged in Macomb with the case.

While investigating the home invasions in December investigators followed up on their initial suspects in the case. Investigators were able to determine that these subjects were not involved in the home invasion but instead were able to seize 140 grams of cannabis and resolve a number of auto burglaries that had occurred earlier in the year. During that investigation, investigators were able to recover a stolen shotgun and other stolen items. Three suspects were arrested.

In December Investigations was called out for two black male subjects passing counterfeit \$100 bills at two locations in Macomb. Patrol was able to come up with a viable suspect which Investigations followed up on that evening. Three suspects were identified as Azahani Stewart, Michael Bradford and Geon Gales. All three subjects were charged with forgery in the case.

In December, investigators worked two separate theft cases occurring at businesses on the east end of Macomb. Hy-Vee reported that a female subject had pushed a cart full of groceries out the front door without paying for them. Hy-Vee provided video surveillance footage of the incident and a suspect was identified by several officers. An Officer and a Detective interviewed the suspect and arrested her.

Wal-Mart reported thefts of electronics late in December. Officers were called to Wal-Mart on December 30 because two suspects in a theft the day before were back in the store trying to steal again. When confronted the suspects fled however officers and investigators were quickly on the scene and apprehended both suspects. After interviews were conducted Investigators went to Avon, IL to recover the other stolen merchandise.

In early December unknown subjects walked off with a winter decoration from the train station. Utilizing social media a call was put out to locate "Frosty the Snowman" and return him to his place of rest. The social media campaign gained tremendous momentum and was shared many times over. The result of this social media campaign was the return of "Frosty" to the train station and some much needed positive publicity for the law enforcement community.

Department Programs

Strategic Response Team (S.R.T.)



2015 was another successful year for the Macomb Police / McDonough County Sheriff's Department Strategic Response Team (SRT). The SRT members engaged in over 668 hours of training in skills ranging from suspect management, approach and deployment, first aid, room entry, and warrant service. This year SRT gained a member from the Sheriff's Department.

In 2015 SRT was called out for 11

different narcotic warrant operations which was double the number from 2014. This included operations working closely with the Illinois State Police Tactical Team to serve four search warrants in one day, two of which were executed simultaneously at different locations. SRT continues to maintain its 100% safety record. No officer or suspect has been injured in operations.

MPD's K9 Program

The Macomb Police Department operates with two K9 units. Having two K9 units increases the chances that a K9 will be available when an officer needs one. The dogs are trained to detect the odor of narcotics and are used to combat drugs in the community. The K9 teams are generally on patrol, but they can be seen at the train station and public presentations. Both K9 units have done a number of presentations at schools over the past year.







Kappes

Officer Tedrow and K9 Landres have been working together for four years. Over the past year Officer Tedrow and K9 Landres have been deployed 75 times. These deployments resulted in 16 misdemeanor charges and 4 felony charges. Officer Tedrow and K-9 Landres have helped with 6 school searches. Officer Wiley has been working with K-9 Kappes for a little more than a year now. Officer Wiley reports that he has deployed K-9 Kappes 81 times in 2015. These deployments resulted in 34 misdemeanor charges and 4 felony charges and 4 felony charges. Officer Wiley and K-9 Kappes have helped with 10 school searches and have conducted 4 tracks and 1 article search.





Landres

Robert Depoy Firearm Range

During the last year the Macomb Police Department range was used by the Macomb Police Department, WIU Office of Public Safety, McDonough County Sheriff's Office and the Illinois State Police District 14. The training over the last year has included handgun qualifications, rifle qualifications and basic training for both handgun and rifle. The range has also been used for the Special Response Team for search warrant service and practice.





D.A.R.E. (Drug Abuse Resistance Education) is a collaborative effort by D.A.R.E. certified law enforcement officers, educators, students, parents, and the community to offer an educational program in the classroom to prevent or reduce drug abuse and violence among children and youth. The emphasis of D.A.R.E. is to help students recognize and resist the many direct and subtle

pressures that influence students to experiment with alcohol, tobacco, marijuana, inhalants, or other drugs, or to engage in violence.

The ten week program offers preventive strategies to enhance those protective factors - especially bonding to the family, school, and community - which research has shown to foster

development of resiliency in students who may be at risk for substance abuse or other problem behaviors. The Macomb Police Department's D.A.R.E. program started in the mid-1980's and has had several instructors since its introduction.

The **School Resource Officer (S.R.O.)** should be viewed as a resource to which the school community can rely on as a law enforcement officer, a law-related counselor, and a law-related teacher. The S.R.O. not only keeps the peace in the schools but provides resource guidance to students, parents, faculty and staff, and educates through presentations a better understanding of our local, state, and federal laws.

The S.R.O. also serves as a positive role model for the students at school during school hours and off the school grounds at extracurricular activities.

Macomb Police Department Honor Guard

The Macomb Police Department organized a formal honor guard in 2015. Made up of volunteer officers these officers are able to present the American flag at events or funerals and support other formal functions with their services. The Honor Guard team members have been formally trained and their dedication and commitment to the program shows in their performance.

Macomb Police Explorers Post #4044

The mission of the Macomb Police Department Explorer Post #4044 is to educate and mentor young men and women who are interested in the field of law enforcement and provide an environment which impresses the importance of community service, responsibility, maturity, and teamwork upon them.

The program provides both lecture and hands-on training opportunities for youth and young adults (age 14-20) and fosters a professional learning environment amongst explorers and post advisors. The program operates on an internal rank structure, which, by design, places explorers in leadership positions and gives them ownership in the program, the department, and their community. Explorers are supervised by advisors; sworn law enforcement officers who oversee the program.

This past year brought much success for the program. Fundraising and donations enabled the program to obtain uniforms, duty gear, and training aids. Explorers participated in ten community service projects, to include a Halloween youth outreach program at Lincoln School where they passed out more than 620 treat bags, spoke on trick-or-treat safety, and provided each child with a blinking safety light. Explorers also assisted with traffic control during the Heritage Days, WIU and MHS Homecoming parades, as well as volunteering their time to paint over graffiti at the old Haeger Pottery Plant and re-painting picnic tables at Spring Lake Park.

In the fall of 2015 the program published an explorer handbook bringing more structure, higher standards, and additional leadership opportunities. Enrollment in the program has spiked from just six explorers one year ago to seventeen. Explorers meet every week for two hours and cover numerous topics to include the use of force, search and rescue, CPR, first aid, traffic control, building searches, and traffic stops just to name a few. Explorers visited the Illinois State Police Academy this summer and gained first-hand experience of the training required to become a certified police officer in the State of Illinois.

Vehicle Impoundment Program

The Vehicle Impoundment program continues to be successful in utilizing new state legislature that allows police departments to impound vehicles for certain violations. The violations included are primarily safety and licensing violations such as Driving Under the Influence of Alcohol, Driving While License Suspended/Revoked, Fleeing a Police Officer, Drug Offenses, or Leaving the scene of an Accident. Over the past four years, the Macomb Police Department has had a high level of success in utilizing the program. In 2015 there were 164 vehicles impounded under the program.

The Macomb Police Department's enforcement of the above violations along with the subsequent towing and impoundment of the offender's vehicle is a continuous effort to make the roads safer for the law abiding motoring public. In 2009 at the beginning of the program the Macomb Police Department handled 118 hit and run accidents. In 2015 only 64 hit and run accidents were reported.

Sex Offender Registration and Notification Act Highlights

The department participated in helping insure compliance by conducting physical address checks. Macomb Police also worked in cooperation with Federal Bureau of Prisons Parole Agents to check compliance of area federal offenders as well. All were compliant.

The agency has reached a level of professional esteem through audits, inspections, and peer critique in an effort to maintain the best practices in the field of policing. The department has been accredited since October of 2012 and will seek further accreditation in 2017.

Social Media Initiatives

Macomb Police have a wonderful relationship with the community. We are striving for ways to interact with our population. Because of the growth of technology, mobile devices, and social media, the Macomb Police Department is active on our website (<u>www.macombpolice.com</u>) as well as on Facebook and Twitter, @MacombPolice. Citizens can stay up to date with information we post. Many people have interacted with officers and asked questions through social media that they did not feel warranted a phone call. We even had crime tips come through social media, but we insist that information come through dispatch or Crimestoppers. Macomb Police has nearly 5000 followers on Facebook and Twitter combined. Many of our posts, media releases, weather or crash announcements, and photos are viewed thousands of times. This technology has helped us connect with the young mobile population at our high school and Western Illinois University.







2015 Polar Plunge



A polar plunge is an event held during the winter where participants enter a body of water despite the low temperature. In the United States polar plunges are usually held to raise money for a charitable organization. Officers from the Macomb Police Dept. take place in the annual event held at Lake Story in Galesburg, IL. Macomb officers raise money with the proceeds going toward the Special Olympics.

Special Olympics is an international organization that changes lives by promoting understanding, acceptance and inclusion between people with and without intellectual disabilities. Through year-round sports training and athletic competition and other related programming for more than 3 million children and adults with intellectual disabilities in more than 180 countries, Special Olympics has created a model community that celebrates people's diverse gifts. Founded in 1968 by Eunice Kennedy Shriver, Special Olympics provide people with intellectual disabilities continuing opportunities to realize their potential, develop physical fitness, and demonstrate courage and experience joy and friendship. The law enforcement community presented Special Olympics Illinois with a check for four million dollars in 2015.





Firetruck Pull

In 2015 the Macomb FOP started a new program to help raise money for Special Olympics. This event was known as the Firetruck Pull. Teams were challenged to pull a firetruck a certain distance for time. The team with the best time would win the event. Since it was the inaugural event the turnout was low however everyone who participated had fun. The team from the Macomb Police Department won the event with the lowest time. Plans are in the works to make this a bigger event in 2016.



Shop with a Cop

The **Shop-With-A-Cop** program is an annual program sponsored by the Macomb Fraternal Order of Police Lodge #189. Each year several children from the Macomb area are selected to be taken to a local department store. Officers spend a few hours with the children and their parents/guardians while shopping for school clothing and supplies.
